The Penyu Shell-Ter Project is an initiative that has been close to our hearts as we celebrate the 70th anniversary of the YTL Group this year. The Penyu Shell-Ter project has been brought to life by many contributing parties doing what they do best. From conservationists, artists, charitable institutions and collectors, we are bonded by the shared desire to affect the world in which we live. Beyond the 2 Non-Governmental Organisations focused on conservation work, this initiative benefits 7 other organisations, whom we have pledged donations to on behalf of each contributing artist.

### The Penyu Shell-Ter Project

Where Art Meets Conservation

The Penyu Shell-Ter Project unites art, community, and conservation to protect Malaysia's endangered turtles. "Penyu" is the Malay word for turtle, a fitting symbol for this project rooted in local culture and conservation.


Launched in celebration of YTL Group's 70th anniversary, the project is carried out under BUILDS, YTL Cement's CSR arm. It showcases 70 concrete turtle sculptures, each reimagined by 51 Malaysian artists and public figures. Together, these creations celebrate local creativity and shared purpose.

Culminating in a charity auction, 100% of proceeds will go to the Turtle Conservation Society of Malaysia (TCS) and PULIHARA.

With the endorsement of the National Art Gallery and the support of YTL Hotels as our venue sponsor, the Penyu Shell-Ter Project stands as a meaningful platform that elevates Malaysian talent and builds a legacy of conservation that endures.

### **Giving Back Through Art**

The Penyu Shell-Ter Project also extends its reach to support seven NGOs across Malaysia. On behalf of each participating artist, YTL Cement is donating RM5,000 to one of the following organisations, ensuring the project's impact ripples across diverse causes.















### Turtle Conservation Society of Malaysia (TCS)

Founded in 2011 by Drs. Chan Eng Heng and Chen Pelf Nyok, the Turtle Conservation Society of Malaysia (TCS) emerged out of necessity when its founders realised that no organisation or agency was dedicated to protecting the country's tortoises and freshwater turtles – despite Malaysia being home to 18 native species.

TCS is the first non-governmental, non-profit organisation in Malaysia focused on the conservation of freshwater turtles. The Society is committed to restoring depleted wild populations through research, community engagement, education, and collaboration with like-minded organisations and individuals.

### PULIHARA (Marine Conservation and Research Organisation Malaysia)

Established in 2023, PULIHARA – formally registered as Persatuan Pemuliharaan dan Kajian Marin Malaysia – is a non-profit organisation dedicated to the protection and restoration of Malaysia's marine ecosystems. The organisation evolved from the well-known Lang Tengah Turtle Watch (LTTW), building on more than a decade of impactful conservation work.

PULIHARA continues the mission initiated under LTTW to safeguard endangered marine species and habitats through research, education, and community engagement. Its work spans turtle conservation, coral reef restoration, and marine debris management, all aimed at fostering a greater sense of stewardship among local communities and visitors alike.

At the heart of PULIHARA's efforts lies its long-standing turtle conservation programme. The team protects nesting beaches, monitors turtle populations, and manages hatcheries to ensure higher hatching success rates. To date, they have safeguarded hundreds of thousands of turtle eggs from human consumption and released hatchlings back into the sea. Through outreach and awareness activities, PULIHARA also works closely with local communities to reduce poaching and promote coexistence with marine wildlife.







His strokes are playful and unapologetic, yet, never has he painted without the absence of Mind. He paints for nobody but himself; for the joy of painting and understanding of Art.


Though obscure and far from fame, he only uses the finest art materials and systems. Outdoor painting is an integral part of his body of work.

### Artist Statement

This work reimagines the turtle as a symbol of endurance, balance, and survival. Layered with vibrant graffiti strokes and textured with clay, the sculpture reflects the rhythm of the ocean, the pulse of the city, and the fragile ecosystems turtles must navigate. Its semi-abstract form mirrors the complexity of conservation, where every action creates ripples of change. Like graffiti transforming forgotten walls into stories, this piece calls for awareness and action to protect our seas and the resilience of life within them.

### **Artist Biography**

Abdulrashade is a graffiti artist and creative entrepreneur from Damansara, Malaysia, and has been active since 2007. His semi-abstract style blends Nusantara culture with modern graffiti, creating vibrant colours, funky shapes and whimsical illustrations - a bold fusion of heritage and street energy that turns public spaces into visual stories.

Inspired by both Malaysian traditions and global street art, his work spans towering murals to intimate canvases, each charged with speed, energy and fearless colour.

As the founder of Blast Store KL, he drives the local graffiti movement, equipping artists with the tools to make their mark.

Abdulrashade isn't just painting walls – he's redefining the future of Southeast Asian street art.

### **Artist Statement**

Since then, he has conducted workshops in major art cities including Paris, Bandung, Jogjakarta, and Bangkok - sharing his unique techniques and passion with global audiences.



#### **Artist Statement**

This hand-painted turtle is a striking piece of art created to promote turtle awareness and conservation. Its shell is decorated with bright blue tones, highlighted by vivid yellow and orange motifs framed in clean white lines, resembling both natural patterns and artistic designs. The flippers and head are painted in intricate blue-and-white mosaic-like textures, giving the turtle a lifelike yet creative appearance. Set against a neutral background, the artwork emphasises the turtle's beauty and uniqueness. It serves as a reminder that sea turtles, though ancient and resilient, face modern threats such as plastic pollution, poaching, and habitat loss, urging us to protect them.


**Artist Biography** 



#### **Artist Statement**

"Golden Turtle" uses acrylic paint with delicate gold leaf accents, inspired by the intricate shell patterns of green sea turtles. The gold highlights symbolise their immense value and the honour they deserve.

The flowing water effects around the turtle reflect its deep bond with the ocean. The tears in its eyes, while a natural process for expelling salt, here represent struggle and resilience each droplet embodying the turtle's relentless fight for survival.

This artwork is a reminder of their challenges and a call for humanity to cherish and protect these majestic creatures.

#### **Artist Statement**

This work is a narrative symbolising the hopeful journey of a turtle. The lines of sunlight create an illusion of movement, as if the turtle is swimming toward the ocean's surface. The elements of light and line are emphasised to give the sculpture a more dynamic and energetic effect. The light serves as a symbol of purity and a beacon revealing the hidden beauty of nature.

This piece is more than just an object. It is a message of conservation. It is a visual dialogue meant to inspire awareness and action. Every small effort holds the potential to create significant change.

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#### **Artist Statement**

I painted a coral reef on the turtle's back with layers of colourful species, imagining the ocean as its home and the reef as its garden. Both depend on each other: the turtle helps the reef by eating algae and controlling sponges, while the reef offers shelter and food. I wanted to show this connection - just as we care for our homes and gardens, turtles rely on reefs for survival. Both are at risk, and their future depends on us. My hope is that this work encourages reflection on our role in protecting this fragile ecosystem so turtle and reef can continue to thrive.

### **Artist Biography**

Amirul Aiman grew up in Ampang, surrounded by creativity through his parents' architectural backgrounds. His passion for art began early with graphite and charcoal, later developing through school events and commissions. Although Amirul began his studies in mechanical engineering, his passion for art led him to pursue Fine Art and earn a Bachelor's Degree in Fine Arts. His work focuses on movement, energy, and the beauty found in everyday life.

This turtle sculpture draws inspiration from the elegance of Chinese blue-and-white porcelain, its shell adorned with floral motifs symbolising cultural refinement and timeless beauty. At the centre rests a childlike figure, wearing a shirt that declares "Say NO to Plastic," confronting viewers with the urgent threat of pollution endangering marine ecosystems. The turtle, long celebrated as a symbol of longevity and wisdom, here becomes more than a cultural emblem - it is a call to action. By uniting heritage with environmental awareness, the artwork reminds us that protecting nature is inseparable from preserving tradition, identity, and the shared future we cherish.

#### **Artist Biography**



#### Artist Statement

An artist's canvas comes alive as one begins to paint, and so did my little turtle. Wondering what images would do this beautiful animal justice, I thought of its habitat: fishes, coral reefs, other turtles, and the many creatures found in Malaysian oceans. Beneath the sea lies a beautiful world.

Fascinated by miniature painting, I painted in layers, wiping away the top to reveal images, with gold as a highlight. It is our responsibility to keep the oceans clean. Plastic bags look like jellyfish and may be swallowed by turtles. We love our oceans, so let's keep them safe for all to enjoy.

### **Artist Biography**

Apart from studying under various teachers in India, Archana Marshall was largely self-taught. Later, in Aleppo, Syria, she worked briefly with a French artist, focusing on architectural drawings of ruins.

After moving to New York, she experimented with different styles and media. This curiosity continues to influence her work today. While combining different techniques, her art is identifiable in the subject matter, which often tells a story.

Inspired by colour and technique, her works reflect a lifetime of experiences. Memories find their place in her art. Growing up in India, rich in culture and tradition, colour and technique shaped an ethos that became an integral part of her practice.

Archana Marshall has exhibited in India, Syria, USA, and Malaysia, with works in collections in New Zealand, India, Malaysia, and USA.

**Artist Biography** 



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
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
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### **Artist Statement**

### Delaila Abdullah






Cemara, my painted turtle, carries the collective weight of Malaysia's endangered marine life. Inspired by the turtle's loyalty and return, she symbolises the bond between nature, memory, and survival. Her shell shelters ocean dwellers such as the whale shark, dugong, squid, and horseshoe crab.

A purple and blue palette reflects the majesty and mystery of the sea, while wave motifs evoke protection and interdependence. This piece honours Malaysia's marine biodiversity and calls for urgent conservation, reminding us the ocean thrives only when every species survives.

#### **Artist Biography**

Delaila Abdullah, born in Kuala Lumpur, is a Malaysian watercolour artist whose work captures the vivid beauty of flora and landscapes. Painting since childhood and professionally since 2009, she works in a realistic yet expressive style, blending loose, bold brushstrokes with bright, uplifting colours.

Her art has earned recognition, including first place at the Pertandingan Lukisan Cat Air Floria Putrajaya (2012), and has featured in exhibitions such as the International Women's Day Art Exhibition (2012, 2013), Of Moments and Memories (2019), and Pameran Cat Air Southeast Asian (2020). **Artist Biography** 







The process begins with a light monochromatic colour, then layers with multiple techniques of airbrush and strokes are applied on the sculpture. Each layer gradually develops light and composition, resulting in an endless proliferation of the subject. And when the surface begins to resemble metal, it symbolises strength for the turtle, and that raw effect is what I try to achieve - to make the turtle look aged, inspired by the issue of extinction.

The concept of the sculpture is decay and growth rising harmoniously within the same turtle, expressing my inner self in my cultural environment.

#### **Artist Biography**



#### **Artist Statement**



### **Artist Biography**




#### Artist Statement


# **Artist Biography**


**Artist Biography**

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
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
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#### **Artist Statement**






## **Artist Biography**


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#### **Artist Statement**
